The Buckingham Canal Society (BCS) was founded in January 1992. It is a Registered Charity, number 1156662 and is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO). It is affiliated to the Inland Waterways Association and has members all over the UK.

The Society's aims are as follows:

- Promote the restoration of the Old Stratford and Buckingham Arms of the Grand Union Canal to good and navigable order and to promote the maintenance and improvement of the Waterway for the benefit of the public.
- Promote the fullest use of the Waterway by all forms of water borne traffic and for all forms of water-related commercial, local amenity, tourist and recreational activity for the public benefit.
- 3. Promote the education of the public in the history and use of the canals and waterways and Buckingham Canal in particular.

Restoration work has commenced at a number of sections of the canal, including Bourton Meadow, Hyde Lane, Little Hill Farm and Cosgrove. Plans are being prepared for creation of a new channel to replace the section from Old Stratford to Deanshanger. Regular maintenance work parties take place along all sections ensure the paths are clear of vegetation regrowth, providing free access for visitors.

So, who's already doing it and what are they doing?

At the Buckingham Canal Society, we've seen volunteers from companies such as Santander, Network Rail and Argos join us on corporate volunteering days. Tasks vary from routine maintenance of our sites to major building projects.

We cater for all ages and abilities in groups of 6 to 20 people, depending on the tasks and equipment available. Larger numbers can be considered by special arrangement. We provide all tools and equipment and training is given where necessary. Health and Safety is very important to us. We always provide a safe working environment and a health and safety talk is given before the start of each work party.

We run work parties on alternate Thursdays and the second Sunday of the month throughout the year. Typically, they start at 10am and finish at 4pm and are at one of four sites along the disused Buckingham Canal, one of them being a designated nature reserve.

What isn't it?

It's also worth pointing out what isn't employee volunteering. Your employees probably take part in loads of charitable activities already, from sponsored runs and bike rides, to volunteering in their spare time. This is great — but it's not employee volunteering. Employee volunteering must be a structured company policy, that not only supports its employee's own efforts, but gives them the time and opportunities to do so.

Costs and Benefits?

Employee volunteering does wonders for engagement and productivity. The associated costs of brokering and organising the volunteering and the lost staff time, could be offset by potential reductions in staff turnover and improved productivity. In fact, employee volunteering may well save you money!
